



2019 In Review

HBI-DC's mission is to mobilize communities to prevent liver diseases caused by viral hepatitis among Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders, African immigrants, and other high-risk groups. Through collaborative partnerships, our organization provides culturally and linguistically appropriate viral hepatitis outreach, education, screening, Hepatitis B vaccination, linkage to care, and patient navigation services for impacted communities.



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In 2019, HBI-DC participated in **75** community events in Washington, D.C., Maryland, and Virginia, providing in-person education to **3146** individuals in the community and free health screenings. As a result, over **70** individuals were linked to care and/or treatment services in 2019!

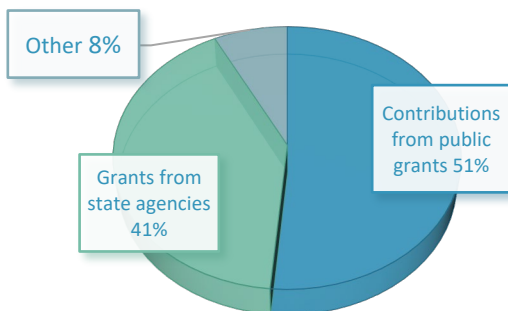
Community Partners

HBI-DC is proud of its grassroots operations in 2019, partnering with over **50** community organizations in Washington, D.C., Maryland, and Virginia to provide public health education and screening events for individuals from **78** different countries of origin.

2019 Financial Overview

Contributions from public grants provided 51% of program revenue and support for HBI-DC in 2019. In addition, 41% of the organization's financial support came from grants from state agencies. The remaining 8% were from other sources, including fundraising events and personal donations. HBI-DC dedicated **88%** of its funds towards direct program services, with 8% spent on management and general expenses. Only 4% of funds were used for fundraising efforts in 2019.
